Football/PVIL-UIL, "Bridging the Gap"




Alfred B. Mays, Sr. played football at L.C. Anderson HS in Austin and graduated in 1970. He played at Southwest Texas State University and then professionally for the San Antonio Toros the New York Giants, and the Calgary Stampeders. Mays completed his pro career in 1980 with the Austin Texans.

Mays worked 20 years for IBM and eight years for Dell computers. He is a member of the Texas Association of Sports Officials and is certified as a NCAA track official and remains an active official after 34 years. He developed a nonprofit organization called ABM Sports, a leadership program for students. Mays is active in the NFL's Retired Players Assoc. and is currently employed with the Circuit of the Americas.

Lucious Newhouse attended Galilee HS in Hallsville from 1959-62 and lettered in football, basketball, baseball, and track. He also played in the band. He graduated with high honors, a 98.5 GPA and was salutatorian of his class.

He studied at Prairie View A&M and also played baseball for four years. In 1966, he received a degree in physical education and biology, an M.S. in physical education and counseling and guidance in 1971, and in 1976 an M.S. in administration and supervision. He began teaching and coaching at Prairie View HS in 1966 and for 23 years in the Dallas ISD.

In 1988, Newhouse began an administrative career as an assistant principal and principal for several Dallas schools and was the first African American president of the DISD Coaches Association. He was also president of the Dallas-Prairie View Alumni Athletic Assn. and president of the Dallas School Administration Assn.

A Vietnam vet, he is semi-retired from DISD with 40 years of dedicated service and is a devoted member of Cedar Crest Cathedral CME Church where he serves as a Care Leader and is a member of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity. He and his wife, Hattie, of 44 years have two sons, Lucious, III and David Keith.
