

PVILCA TO HONOR LOCAL ATHLETES OF THE PAST

After decades without recognition for their achievements, high-school athletes from A. R. Turner in Willis and Booker T. Washington (BTW) in Conroe are finally being paid their due. Five football players from Booker T. Washington (Conroe) and four from A. R. Turner (Willis) had standout careers at the all-black schools during the early 1960's before integration in the late 1960's. These high-school athletes will be inducted into the Prairie View Interscholastic League Coaches Association (PVILCA) Hall of Fame on July 23 in Forth Worth, TX. A. R. Turner's head football coach, Julius Shanklin, will also be recognized at the awards ceremony, as he will be inducted into the PVILCA - Hall of Honor. "The reason we are doing it now is because many outstanding black high-school athletes that won or played in a state championship game during the years of segregation didn't get recognized," Robert Brown, Board Chairman of the PVILCA, said. "These athletes played in the 50's and 60's and we want to give them the recognition they deserve."

The Booker T. Washington football inductees collectively played in five state championships (1960, 1961, 1963, 1964 and 1965,) and won two, (1960 and 1965.) The head coach during that era was Charles W. Brown. The 2011 BTW inductees are Ben L. Cavil Jr., Frank Moaning, Oscar Greenwood, Pastor William 'BB' Denman and the late great Paul T. Gipson.

Several players went on to play collegiate and professional football. Paul Gipson earned All State honors for three years at BTW in Conroe and was an All American at the University of Houston. Paul Gipson also played in the NFL for the Atlanta Falcons, Detroit Lions and the New England Patriots. Frank Moaning played for teams at BTW in Conroe that won the baseball state-championship in the spring of 1960 and the football state-championship in the fall of 1960. In addition, he had a 'Hall of Fame' career at Prairie View A. & M. College. Pastor William 'BB' Denman and Oscar Greenwood also won both state-championships in football Fall of 1965 and baseball (Spring of 1966) for the BTW Bulldogs in Conroe.

Coach Julius Shanklin is being recognized for his long career at A. R. Turner School in Willis, TX. After graduating from Prairie View A. & M. College, he coached in Willis from 1961 until his retirement in 1999. Coach Shanklin also won a state-championship during his coaching career.

Lettering for three years under Coach Shanklin was George Richardson, one of the four A. R. Turner players inducted into the Hall of Fame. The other players being recognized for their high-school football careers are Earnest Feggins, Michael Williams and Claude E. Harvey. Claude Harvey played in the NFL for the Philadelphia Eagles and the Houston Oilers.

Let Us Not Forget

Gene Washington an inductee into the NCAA College Football Hall of Fame Class of 2011

EAST LANSING, Mich. - Former Michigan State two-time All-American Gene Washington is one of 14 players and two coaches named to the College Football Hall of Fame Tuesday, May 17. National Football Foundation President/CEO Steve Hatchell and FOX Sports analyst Charles Davis announced the 2011 Class at the NASDAQ MarketSite in New York City.

A three-year starter for Coach Duffy Daugherty from 1964-66, Washington helped Michigan State to a combined record of 23-6-1 during his career, including back-to-back Big Ten and National Championships in 1965-66. During that three-year span, the Spartans posted a 17-3 record in Big Ten games. A two-time First-Team All-American and two-time First-Team All-Big Ten selection (1965-66), Washington led team in receptions for three-straight seasons.

"I was pleasantly surprised when I received the news," Washington said. "This is a tremendous honor and I want to thank all of the voters who decided to mark my name on the ballot.





"I came from a completely segregated high school system, so I'm most grateful for Michigan State providing me with opportunities to receive a great education while competing in a totally integrated environment. Beyond my athletic achievements, I'm most proud of my education because I knew It would be important to have a second career after football.

"I appreciate the tremendous leadership skills of Duffy Daugherty," Washington continued. "He created a comfortable environment for the players and coaches alike. Duffy had a calm, business-like approach to things, so players understood and accepted their roles for the good of the team.

"I was fortunate to be a member of some great Michigan State teams. I was surrounded by great teammates, like George Webster, Bubba Smith and Clinton Jones, and Duffy knew how to pull it all together."

The La Porte, Texas, native burst onto the scene as a sophomore in 1964, setting then-school single-season records for receptions (35) and receiving yards (542) to go along with his five touchdown catches. In 1964, Washington also set then-Spartan single-game records for receptions (nine) and receiving yards (150) at Notre Dame. In addition, he earned Academic All-Big Ten and Academic All-America (second team) honors as a sophomore.

The Days of Yesteryear Carver High School Historical Marker Unveiling Ceremony Slated for April 30

The Texas Historical Commission has recognized the George Washington Carver High School in Baytown as a significant part of Texas history by awarding a Texas Historical Marker. The designation honors the former all-black high school (in operation from 1948-1967) as an important and educational part of local history.

The Baytown Carver High School Recognition & Preservation Society, which is currently working with Goose Creek CISD, City of Baytown, the Harris County Historical Commission and Exxon Mobil, is sponsoring a historical marker unveiling and dedication ceremony commemorating the school. The event will take place on Saturday, April 30, at 1:30 p.m. in the Robert E. Lee High School Auditorium. The doors will open at noon to allow the general public time to view historic displays related to the school. Carver alumnus will also have time to visit with each other before the start of the program.

Speakers for the afternoon will include Lee College Professor Ray E. Whitlow, Jr., Congressman Gene Green, Baytown Mayor Stephen H. Don Carlos, GCCISD Superintendent Dr. Toby York, Lee College History Professor John Britt, Gene Washington (former great Carver athlete and Kysa Anderson-Daniels, author/motivational speaker and former CNN anchor who will be mistress of ceremony. Other special guests include Chairman Janet and Debra Blacklock-Sloan of the Harris County Historical Commission (HCHC), Phyllis Earles (Prairie View A&M University Archivist), Robert Brown (Prairie View Interscholastic League Association Chairman), Top Ladies of Distinction, Inc., Black Educational Access Committee, Baytown Heritage Society, Baytown Historical Preservation Association and the La Porte Bay Area Heritage Society. Groups to perform during the ceremony include the combined jazz bands, marching bands, swing choirs of Robert E. Lee, Ross S. Sterling High R.O.T.C., groups from G.W. Carver Elementary School, St. Joseph Catholic School, Harlem Elementary, the Buffalo Soldiers, Gospel Spiritual Light Choir, Mt. Calvary Baptist Church Choir and Spirit of Carver Chorale Choir. "It is vital that as we move forward, we do not forget our past. Not only will this Texas Historical Marker provide awareness in the Baytown community of the fascinating history of this outstanding former all black high school, this state marker will make sure that the Baytown George Washington Carver High School history will never be lost," said J. Warren Singleton, who helped spearhead the marker initiative. When this Texas historical marker is erected, this will be the first state historical marker erected in the City of Baytown representing African American heritage.



Carver at a Glance

George Washington Carver High School, built on a six-acre plot on Oak and Carver streets was donated by the Humble Oil and Refining Company in the Oak addition of Baytown.

Carver High School was built in the late forties and opened in the


spring of 1948 for not only Baytown's black students, but for students from surrounding communities. Carver High School remained an all-black high school through 1967. During this time, Carver had many successes in sports activities and produced an All-American, Eugene Washington. When the school integrated, former Carver students went to Robert E.Lee or Ross S. Sterling high schools.

Carver then became an elementary school known as George Washington Carver Elementary the first year; then Carver-Jones Elementary with the closure of Anson Jones Elementary. In 1988, the name was changed back to George W. Carver Elementary. This original school was closed after seeping hydrocarbons bubbled to the surface from an earthen fuel-oil reservoir filled by Humble Oil, which later became Exxon.

A new Carver Elementary School, located on the former Horace Mann Junior School site on Pruett Street, was built in 2002.

SPOTLIGHT PERSONALITY CHARLES GARCIA

Charles Garcia's athletic career began in Rosenberg, Texas at A. W. Jackson High School and continued at Prairie View A&M University. There, he lettered in football and baseball, playing on a National Championship team and on two Southwestern Conference championship teams. He graduated in 1957, with a major in P.E. and science, and later earned a Master of Science. Garcia pursued a coaching career that included Cuero

High School, Crosby High School in Hitchcock, Texas (Coach of the Year 1964), Pinkston High School, Bishop College, and Jackson State University. For thirty years, Charles was employed as an NFL scout for teams including the Seattle Seahawks, Cleveland Browns, New England Patriots, Chicago Bears, and Minnesota Vikings.

In recognition of his lifetime involvement in sports, Charles was inducted into the Prairie View Sport Hall of Fame, the Texas Black Sports Hall of Fame, the PVILCA Hall of Honor. He is also a member of the Black College HOF selection Committee. In 2007, the Fritz Pollard Alliance created an award in Charles' name to be given annually to a NFL scout who exemplifies the skill and work ethics necessary to become a professional scout. Since retirement, Charles is actively involved in his church, The Prairie View A&M Alumni Association, The African American Museum Sports Advisory committee, and Thorntree Country Club. He also shares his life with his wife, Shirley, five adult children and five grandchildren


