

Brittney Griner has become a basketball legend across the nation. Griner a 6'8" senior at Aldine Nimitz high school in Houston, Texas started receiving national attention in 2007 after a video of her displaying her dunking abilities surfaced on YouTube. In the 2006-2007 season, as a sophomore she averaged 23 points 11 rebounds and six blocked per game, including six triple doubles. She has grown eight inches since her freshman year and her


father expects her to tap out at 6-foot-10 or 6-foot-11. Griner wears a size 18 shoes in men's and boasts an 86 inch wingspan, during the 2007-2008 season Giner led the area in scoring, blocked shots and dunks. On Feb. 11, 2008 Griner posted 29 points, 13 rebounds, 11 blocked shots and nine assists in helping her team to a first round playoff win over rival Westside High School. In that game, she dunked twice. She finished her junior year averaging 24.6 points, 12.3 rebounds and 5.9 blocks per game. She also shot 64% from the field. The Griner led Cougars ended the season with a 27-8 winning record. In the 2008-2009 basketball season, Griner now a senior averaged 27.5 points per game, as well as, a double-double. She also recorded 11 triple-doubles. The Nimitz High Cougars season ended on March 7, 2009 at the Texas State Champions Basketball Tournament in Austin, Texas. 


