

'It Started With 25"




Saturday, July 28th, 2012 was the date the Prairie View Interscholastic League Coaches Associations held it's 33rd Annual Hall of Honor and Hall of Fame Banquet. The festivities were held in San Antonio, Texas at the Hyatt Regency Hotel. Last year in Fort Worth, we were promised by Chairman Robert Brown, that he would search for a venue that could accommodate the more than 800 attendees. Last year's attendance of 600 plus resulted in an overflow situation. This event seems to grow year after year and has become the place to be, once the date, time and location is announced. King Arthur **Prayther**, the perennial master of ceremony, in his opening remarks, recalled the first luncheon attendance of being a less than a turn-away crowd of 25. He delighted himself in reminding us of the legends who would not let this dream die. The hard work of Jap

Jones, Donald Grace, Walter Day, (who is credited with chronicling the history of the PVILCA Coaches Association), Andrew "Pat" Patterson and many more laid the foundation for this organization. Today, We stand on the broad shoulders of those men who refused to let this part of our history be forgotten.

Before the luncheon began, there was an atmosphere of excitement as former coaches met their former students, co-workers and competitors. Over the years, memories have a tendency to grow (but not to the point of exaggeration), because they are the facts as we lived them. The recollection of the past brings back many joys. The future is just that, because we don't know what it will bring. We realize that we can't live in the past forever, but certainly we can share it with our children. That's what history is all about.

Arthur Gillum, in that deep baritone voice, gave the Invocation followed by Thomas "Jack" Bellinger with the Welcome. James "Clint" Williams introduced the speaker of the evening. Delvin Williams, NFL running back is a


Big Hamp reminded us that back in the day we had the "no pass no play"rule. Coaches enforced it.







2011 and 2012. At 26, Johnson was the youngest head coach to coach in the UIL state championship game. Since becoming the head coach at Kimball Royce has complied a record of 312 wins and 89 losses in 12 seasons. In 2002, Johnson was chosen to coach the



USA team in the 18 and under Global Games.The USA team won it's only gold medal. On that team were future NBA stars, Chris Bosh, Ike Diougo, Antione Wright and Jarrett Jack.

June Villers is a graduate of Desoto High School and the University of Texas-Arlington. She has been

coaching and teaching mathematics for 16 years. Desoto Track Team won 5A State Villers' Championships in 2009, 2011 and 2012.

Greg Williams, a native of Waco, graduated from



Richfield High in1983. He began his teaching and coaching career at Lancaster. After 8 years he left to become head track coach at Wilmer-Hutchins High School. In 1998, he returned to Lancaster. Under his leadership, the Tigers have won 11 District Championships, 5 Regional Championships and 4 State

Championships, narrowly missing a 3-peat. Marcus Wortham graduated in 1993 from Calvert High School where he was a three sports star in foorball, basketball and track. Marcus earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Physical Education from Texas A&M University in Canyon, Texas. He

became head coach of his alma mater winning the 2012 Division 1A State Basketball Championship.





speech coach, Mrs. Doris Bradford Williams who coached Deloris, Norma Woods and Lavella Hayes to first place in the PVIL Declamation Contest. She attended the following institutions, Hampton Institute, Texas Woman's University, University of Houston, Texas Southern University and the University of Guadalajara. After 33 years of service, Deloris retired from H.I.S.D in 1995.

One portion of the program was the highlight of the banquet. King Arthur Prayther, Master of Ceremony, and Leon Hamilton, Timekeeper par **Excellence**, explained the rules and regulations of the acceptance speeches and demonstrated how the time was to be kept. He first asked all the wives to stand to be recognized because he knew the other half might forget. He advised the honorees that their speeches were limited to two minutes. So due to age, some needed to get a head start so that when their time came to speak they would be near the podium.

Leon explained that when he stood up the honoree should be near the end of his or her speech. If the speaker continued, he would do as it is done in church, he would clear his throat. And finally, if the speaker continued, he would use his Lionel Hampton xylophone instrument. and play a tune. The first honoree used only 12 seconds of his 2 minute allotment.

The honorees were so brief in their acceptance speeches, that the timekeeper could not play his xylophone. King Arthur suggested that he go to the




back and help in the kitchen.

Astrodome. Hebert High School won the Texas State Football Championship in 1976. In 1981, Hebert was renamed Westbrook and they won the State Championship

Rev. Danny Davis is a native of Dallas. Texas. He was the first black quarterback to integrate Carter High School. In 1974. he became the starting quarterback at the University of Houston where accumulated a 20-5 record. In 2002 Danny was inducted in the University of Houston Hall of Fame. Tommy Lee

Gregg, Jr. a 1970 graduate of old L. C. Anderson High School in Austin, Texas, played all three sports but excelled in track. Tommy attended Grambling College after being recruited by Olympian Lee Calhoun. While in high school, Tommy was on the mile relay team that won the state title and was recognized as one of the best relay teams in the nation.

Eugene (Gene) Cobbin, 67, of Richmond, Texas, former Business Representative for the International Association Machinist and Aerospace Workers (IAM) transitioned from this life on Monday, June 18, 2012. Gene was a

graduate of A.W. Jackson High School in Rosenberg, Texas. He was a three sport athlete and received the "Best All-Around Athlete Award". In 1962 he led his football team to the Co-District Championship as a running back and Linebacker. That same year he led his basketball team to the semi-finals. As a sprinter and a member of the 440 yard relay team, he participated in several state track meets and became a three-year letterman in each sport.

Upon graduating from high school, Gene attended Texas Southern University and began employment with WKM Manfacturers in Missouri City, Texas as a machinist. A noted veteran and leader in the labor movement, he became a member of the International Association of Machinists and Aerospace Workers Local 1303. He later was elected thus employed as District Local 37 Busines Representative and president of Tideland Central Labor Council. He furthered his education at the International Association of Machinists Institute and served as an active district educational representative. He was elected as one of three machinists delegates to the National AFL-CIO. He was employed as an Organizer for the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees. He was the recipient of a certificate of Congressional Recognition from the Honorable Sheila Jackson. He is the owner of Cobbin Enterprises Unlimited.

Gene Cobbin is survived by his devoted wife, Dr. Jacqueline Cobbin, his two children, Joseph Adams (Kathy); Byron Cobbin (Sonya) and one stepson, Charles Horton (Toni). He was awarded an Honorary Doctor of Humanities Degree from Wiley College.

Felix was a coach and teacher of science and physical education in the Houston ISD for 36 years. He also served in various administrative positions and was the first African-American to be named principal of Sharpstown Senior High School, a predominantly white

secondary school in H.I.S.D.

He served for 20 years as adjunct Professor of Higher Education at Texas Southern University and on numerous boards which included the Wiley Board of Trustees, Harris County Sports Convention Center Board (HCSCC) and Trinity Gardens Baptist Church, where he had a lifetime membership; He also was a founding member of the Houston Partnership, Harris County Hospital Board of Managers and the Advisory Board to the State Board of Education under former Governor of Texas, Mark White.

In 2006, an HISD school was named in his honor. The principal of the school, Laquetta Kennedy, spoke at the funeral and told how each year, on the first day of school, Felix Cook would come and walk the halls, greeting the faculty and students and wishing them great success in the upcoming school year.

He is survived by a devoted son, Rev. Dwayne B. Cook, daughter, Alecia Davis, sister Ethel B. Washington

and a host of family and friends.

Felix Cook Jr. was inducted into the PVILCA Hall of Fame in 1988 and was life member.
